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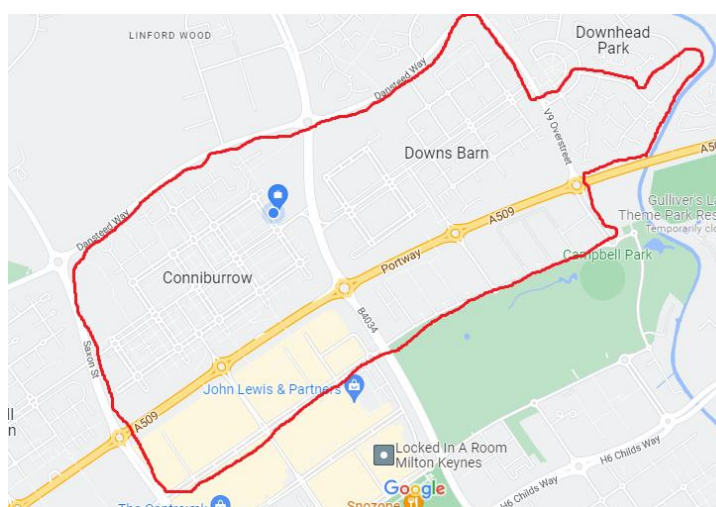
SOUTHWOOD SCHOOL

ADMISSION ARRANGEMENTS SEPTEMBER 2027

Southwood is a 7-11 junior school. Entry to the school takes place in September when Year 3 pupils will be admitted. The school does not operate a selection process and places are available for pupils in line with our Equalities Policy and irrespective of where a pupil lives.

The Defined Area

City Centre North, Conniburrow, Downs Barn, Downhead Park South and Campbell Park, North of the Park. The exact defined area can be seen on the attached map.



Admissions Procedure

Children will be admitted to Southwood School at the age of 7. Any parent, wherever the family lives, wishing for a place at Southwood must complete the Local Authority's application online process. Parents should familiarise themselves with this information and take a particular note of the definitions provided, dates and deadlines. Milton Keynes Council co-ordinates admissions to all primary schools in Milton Keynes and parents cannot apply directly to the school.

Although Southwood School is the admissions authority, the Local Authority, as required by the Department for Education co-ordinates the admission arrangements for all schools/academies in Milton Keynes and will communicate all admission decisions to parents for entry to Year. Decisions on September intake admissions are usually made in March when parents will be informed and offered a place by Milton Keynes Council on behalf of the Governing Body.

If a place is required during the school year, for example when a family moves into the area, parents should still apply via the Local Authority.

Fraudulent Information If the allocation of a place has been made on the basis of fraudulent or intentionally misleading information, the Governors reserve the right to withdraw the place.

Oversubscriptions Criteria

Priority will be given to children with an Educational Health Care Plan (EHCP), naming Southwood, in the normal round of admissions for children transferring at 7 +.

The Published Admission Number (PAN) for Year 3 in September 2027 is 60.

In the event that there are more applications than places available, applications will be ranked as per the oversubscription criteria as follows:

- 1.Children who are looked after (LAC) and all previously looked after children (PLAC) including those children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted (IAPLAC).
- 2.Children eligible for the service premium*.
3. Siblings of children who are attending the school at the time allocations are made and are expected to be on roll at the school at the time of the proposed admission and the place of residence is within the catchment area of the school.
- 4.The child's place of residence is within the catchment area of the school and there is no sibling.
- 5.Siblings of children who are attending the school at the time allocations are made and are expected to be on roll at the school at the time of the proposed admission and the place of residence is outside of the catchment area of the school.
- 6.Children of staff at the school where the member of staff has been employed at the school for two or more years at the time at which the application for admission to the school is made, and /or the member of staff is recruited to fill a vacant post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.
- 7.“Distance” from the school to the place of residence.

In the case of multiple births, places will be offered to all children, even if this takes us over the admission number of the school.

A sibling is a brother or sister, which for admission purposes means brothers and sisters of whole or half blood or any other child (including an adopted child) who permanently resides at the same address and for whom the parent also has parental responsibility.

If it is not possible to offer your child a place at this school then you will be advised about how you can appeal against that decision. The Local Authority will also let you know about available places at other schools. The PAN for Southwood School is 60 pupils.

Late Applications

Late applications will be acknowledged and if places are unavailable, the child will be placed on the school's waiting list in criteria order.

Waiting List

A waiting list will be maintained in the order of the oversubscription criteria and families will be contacted to see if they wish to remain on the list.

The waiting list will remain until 31st December of each school year of admission. Each added child will require the list to be ranked again in line with the published oversubscription criteria.

The waiting list will be checked when a pupil vacancy arises, or when a child is removed from the allocation list

Independent Admissions Appeal Committee

Parents who are not offered a place for their child in the Year 3 Class are entitled to appeal to an independent committee under provisions of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 as amended by section 40 of the Education & Inspections Act 2006. Parents wishing to appeal in these circumstances should contact the school office for an Appeal Form.

Germander Park is a 2 – 7 Infant school and Nursery.

For the Nursery:

The school will offer children a place in the Nursery for the term after their second birthday, according to the criteria below. A place in our nursery does not automatically confer admission to the school. A child will remain in the Nursery until the end of the academic year in which they are 4 years old.

Provision is offered for either:

- 15 hours – five mornings or five afternoons per week (additional sessions can be attended, subject to availability and a payment of £15 per session)
- 30 hours – five days a week, all day (by qualifying for 30 hours of free childcare)

Nursery class sessions are from 8.45am to 11.45am and from 12.15pm to 3.15pm. Admissions forms are available from the school office.

In the event that there are more applications than places available in the Nursery, applications will be ranked as per the oversubscription criteria as follows:

1.Children who are looked after (LAC) and all previously looked after children (PLAC) including those children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted (IAPLAC).

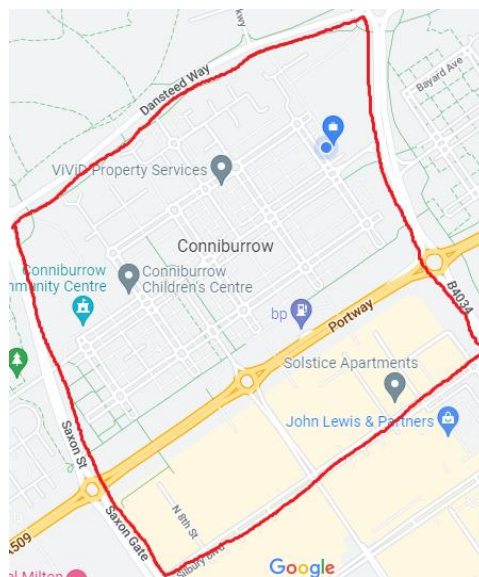

Admissions Procedure

Children start school for the first time in the September following their fourth birthday. By law, a child must have started school at the beginning of the term following their fifth birthday. 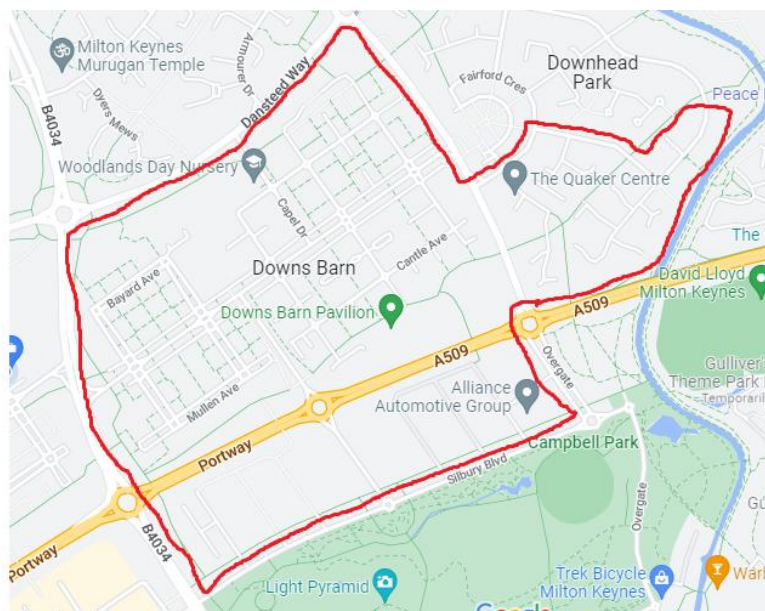
Independent Admissions Appeal Committee
